Growing Change: Seiph Abdul Jafari Takes Agriculture to the Field



In Masasi District, Mo Scholar Seiph Abdul Jafari, a student of Crop Production and Management at Sokoine University of Agriculture (SUA) in Morogoro, is turning his education into action. While still pursuing his degree, Seiph is already supporting farmers and youth through voluntary extension services offering guidance, practical support, and a fresh outlook on agriculture as a profession.

Seiph launched the Mo Extension Support Service to bridge the gap between academic knowledge and on-the-ground farming realities. His goal is simple but powerful


"I want farmers and young people to see agriculture not just as tradition but as an opportunity." says Seiph

Through a four-phase **approach , assessment, training, direct support, and monitoring** Seiph has begun working with farmers in Masasi, focusing on staple crops like maize and tomatoes. He's identified key challenges such as pest outbreaks, low soil fertility, and poor planting methods, and is responding with targeted interventions and farmer education.

He's also creating digital support spaces including WhatsApp groups to keep farmers and youth connected, informed, and motivated.

Seiph's initiative is a clear example of how the Mo Dewji Foundation scholarship doesn't just fund education it fuels **leadership and impact.**

"The scholarship gave me a platform," Seiph says. "Now I'm using it to uplift others."



AGAINST ALL ODDS: EMMANUEL'S JOURNEY FROM FAILURE TO FIERCE PURPOSE

When you meet Emmanuel Bingile Kidanha, you see quiet confidence and a deep sense of purpose. But what many don't see is the road he took to get here one paved with **failure, resilience, and an unshakable belief in the power of second chances**. Emmanuel's story is not typical. He failed his Form 4 national exams four times. Most would have given up but not Emmanuel.

He pressed on, refusing to let his past define his future. He pursued a diploma, and with relentless hard work and discipline, graduated with a perfect **GPA of 5.0**. His academic comeback is nothing short of extraordinary a testament to what can happen when courage meets opportunity.

In his second year of university, pursuing a **Bachelor's Degree in Health Management Systems**, Emmanuel's unwavering determination was recognized when he was selected as a **Mo Scholar**. The scholarship not only lightened his financial burden it gave him a platform to grow, serve, and lead. And lead he did.

In March 2025, Emmanuel organized and led a powerful outreach program at Mabwepande Secondary School, delivering a participatory health education session titled "**Prevention of Sexually Transmitted Diseases**." With a group of Form Four students in front of him students not unlike his younger self Emmanuel created a safe space for open dialogue, helping them understand how to protect their health and future.

He used the simplest of tools chalk, paper, and a heart full of experience to make a lasting impact. "This session wasn't just for them," Emmanuel shared. "**It was for the younger version of me who needed someone to show that failure doesn't define you what you do after does.**"

The outreach was received with gratitude by both students and school management. But even more powerful was how it shaped Emmanuel himself refining his public speaking, deepening his empathy, and affirming his mission to serve his community.

As we celebrate the **Watoto wa Mo** campaign, Emmanuel's journey reminds us why this program exists: to **uncover the leaders in the overlooked, to fuel those who refuse to give up, and to help young people rise beyond circumstance.**

Today, Emmanuel stands as that ambassador.
