This September, young people refreshed their screens, borrowed data bundles, and opened the Mo Scholars application form with one shared thought: *this could change everything.*

For two intense weeks, the application system became more than a platform. It became a pulse. A national surge of hope, determination, and belief in what education can unlock. Even as staff, we could not have anticipated what followed.

By the time the window closed, 59,343 individuals had accessed the application. Of these, 10,569 began the journey, carefully answering questions that asked them to reflect on leadership, resilience, and their vision for the future; completing the application required time, access, and courage. In the end, 2,634 applications were fully submitted. At the same time, thousands more were started but left unfinished, a reminder of both ambition and the real barriers many young people continue to face.

But 2,634 is not just a number.



It is **2,634** young people standing up and saying, *“I believe in my future.”* Compared to the **1,600** applications received last year, this surge was not just growth. It was a statement.

The Mo Scholars Programme has become a lifeline and a symbol of trust in a country where access to education can transform families, communities, and generations.



From this remarkable pool and interview process, **55** exceptional scholars emerged. They are not only academically strong; they are resilient, courageous, and deeply committed to making an impact. These young leaders will pursue fields aligned with Tanzania's development priorities, including Medicine, Engineering, Data Science, ICT, Education, Finance, and Community Development.

There is Emmanuel Majaliwa Vicent, who learned to stand on his own after losing parental support, surviving through car washing to meet daily needs. For Emmanuel, the Mo Scholars Programme is not just support; it is proof that resilience and belief have meaning.

There is Alinda Anuruphus Mpanjo, the firstborn in a family shaped by hardship, where responsibility came early, and education was never guaranteed. Despite this, she founded *A Love Foundation*, driven by the belief that leadership means rising and lifting others with you.

There is Richard Masunga Bernad, whose life has been shaped by loss and persistence. Working in welding workshops to fund his education, he learned that hardship does not limit potential. It sharpens it.



And there is Gloria Antony Malima, raised by her grandmother and determined from her first year to take ownership of her education. By working to pay her own school costs, she discovered that resilience can be quiet, disciplined, and powerful enough to change a future.

These stories are not exceptions. They are the heartbeat of this year's Mo Scholars cohort.


They remind us of a simple truth:
